This April marks the 20th anniversary of National Poetry Month which, over the years, has become the largest literary celebration in the world; schools, publishers, libraries, book-sellers, and poets celebrating poetry's important

place in our culture.

National Poetry Month is a celebration of poetry organized by the Academy of American Poets as a way to increase awareness and appreciation of poetry in the

United States. The Academy of American Poets' website, poets.org, serves as a hub for information about poetry events during the month. The organization also provides free educational resources to teachers for classroom celebrations and activities, and commissions an annual festival poster.

The organization sponsors **Poem-a- Day**, the original and only daily digital

poetry series featuring over 200 new, previously unpublished poems by to-day's talented poets. On weekdays, poems are accompanied by exclusive commentary by the poets; on weekends, the series highlights classic poems. Launched

in 2006, Poem-a-Day is now distributed via email, web, and social media to 300,000+readers free of charge. Sign up at poets.org to receive a new poem in your inbox every day.

In 1999,

UNESCO (the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization) declared March 21 to be World Poetry Day. The purpose of the day is to promote the reading, writing, publishing and teaching of poetry throughout the world and, as the UNESCO session declaring the day says, to "give fresh recognition and impetus to national, regional and international poetry movements."

Kim Cross, Author of What Stands in a Storm Featured at Roswell Reads Luncheon

Nearly 250 readers heard author Kim Cross talk about her book What Stands in a Storm at the 11th annual Roswell Reads Literary Luncheon on March 12th at the Roswell Adult Recreation Center.

The book skillfully weaves together the science of tornadoes and the human stories of the people involved in the biggest tornado outbreak in recorded history. Kim told about the writing of the book—how she was wary of exhausting readers with nothing but fear and fast-paced action—and how she alternated short action-filled chapters with information chapters laying out the scientific context of the storm.

The result is non-fiction that reads like a novel.

Roswell Reads promotes the value of reading, literacy, and lifelong learning through the shared community-wide experience of reading and discussing a common book. The Roswell Reads Steering Committee is made up of volunteers who select the book and plan the programming. The City of Roswell and the Friends of the Roswell and East Roswell Libraries provide funding.

Best Buy Teen Tech Centers to Open in Atlanta


This spring, the <u>Best Buy Teen Tech Center network</u> will open four new centers in Atlanta. AFPLS has been selected as a partner. The new centers will offer year-round after-school programming for teens. The Atlanta locations will join 8 existing centers in Chicago, Denver, Jersey City, Miami, Minneapolis, San Antonio, Seattle and Washington, D.C.

From May through September, more than 6,000 students will attend <u>Geek</u> <u>Squad Academy</u> (GSA), free, two-day summer camp sessions across the country. Teen Tech Center and GSA curricula encourage teens to explore technology through training in music, film production, photography, coding, 3D design, robotics and more.

Geek Squad Academy will kick off in Atlanta in May and include a total of 30 camps. Watch for the summer camp schedule; it will be announced some time this month.



Spring in Roswell - what a wonderful time of year! The bulbs have bloomed, the flowering trees followed. Roswell is in full bloom and "wearing her ball gown."

Spring signifies a new beginning and a fresh start; we can air out our homes, soak up the sunshine, tidy up the yard, plant a spring garden with English peas, sit in a folding chair at a youngster's soccer or baseball game, play a round of golf.... How do you celebrate spring?

As children, during our spring break, we'd fly paper kites purchased for less than 50 cents from the local corner grocery store. We'd unwrap them carefully then lick the glue to "paste" the edges down along the string between the slender balsa-wood frames.

My dad liked kites and would often help us make our own from newspaper, sticks, and paste from a jar. Dad's kite always went high and waved it's long cloth tail against the beautiful blue, spring sky.

And, after a long, snowy winter, I knew where the first hepaticas, wild purple violets and stinky trillium bloomed in early spring. I would tromp across the wet, muddy fields to the woods to pick handfuls of each to go into a mason jar on the kitchen table.

Here in Roswell, the library has books that deal with all aspects of spring: gardening--from planning to planting; weather; playing baseball and soccer; and coaching sports, for involved and/or interested adults.

These sunny spring days I like to go

out on my deck or front porch to read; the temperature is just right.

In the warm spring rain, the flowers are bright under the gray sky. There's excitement in the air surrounding the spring religious holidays and spring break. Our library has a full collection of books on crafts and cooking, on most of the religions of the world and how to celebrate them, and travel.


Atlanta Authors Presents
