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# Roswell Reads What Stands in a Storm by Kim Cross

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April 27, 2011 marks the deadliest day of the biggest tornado outbreak in the history of recorded weather. Entire communities were flattened and, in seconds,

whole neighborhoods erased by the wind when a total of 349 tornadoes touched down in 21 states from Texas to New York.

Journalist Kim Cross expertly weaves together the science with the human stories of several characters—-including college students, weathermen, storm-chasers and a team of rescuers—-in the story of Dixie Alley, Alabama,

where there are more tornado fatalities than anywhere in the US and where the trees and hills obscure the storms until they are bearing down upon you.


The book tells the story of the storm through the people who lived it. All the

characters and events in the book are real, and their stories are based on more than a year of research by the author and supported by over one-hundred hours of

> interviews with responders, meteorologists, survivors and the families of those who died.

Once you've started reading this book — broken down into three sections of The Storm, The Aftermath, and The Recovery — you won't be able to put it down. At parts, you'll laugh, because even in the telling of a tale of woe, there is humor,

and you'll cry. And yes, you'll have new respect for storms, new respect for the weathermen and women who report the storms, and you'll have renewed faith in the strength of humans to bond together in tragic circumstances.





## About the Author

An award winning writer and editor, Kim began writing for her local newspaper as a senior in high school. After graduating with a journalism degree from the University of Alabama and working in the field for several years, Kim returned to Tuscaloosa for a graduate fellowship in the journalism school. She worked for several newspapers then worked on staff for Southern Living and Cooking Light for almost a decade before quitting her job to write this book. Now a full-time freelance writer and journalism instructor at the University of Alabama, Kim lives in Birmingham with her husband and eight-year-old son.

### Message from the President

Greetings to all the Friends of the Roswell Library!

From 1946 - 1960 twelve ladies in our little town enjoyed a book club. Every year, each one selected a title and the chairman, with cash in hand, went to the city and from the office supply/book store bought the twelve hardcover books. Titles such as The Egg and I by Betty MacDonald, 1945; The Caine Mutiny by Herman Wouk, 1954; Love is Eternal by Irving Stone, 1954; or A Tree Grows in Brooklyn, by Betty Smith, 1943, were selected. Hand written on paper neatly pasted to the inside cover of each book was a list of the ladies names, the numbers I-12 and the titles. In January, each had her chosen book but by February first, it was passed it on to the next member on the list. There was a chance to visit when delivering books, and an opportunity to read twelve different titles each year.

At the country school we were well aware of what books were in circulation and which ones were considered the best.

In 1960, the library in the city acquired a bookmobile and the book club disbanded. In my mind's eye, I can still see my mother with her basket over her arm, joining all vember Book Sale. Our next sale the ladies and retired men, once a month, as the bookmobile parked in our town. Imagine asking for a book and the next month having it delivered? Imagine the excitement of having a basket full of hardcover

books for my dad, my granddad and for her to enjoy until the bookmobile arrived again? Good memories.

Here at our Roswell Library in the community room our Mystery book club meets on the fourth Tuesday evening at 6:30 PM and our Noonday Nosh book club meets the third Tuesday at 12 noon. All are welcome. Do come and join the interesting discussions.
