the classics in school in favor of more popular titles? This is a good time to catch up.




Create fun monthly or yearly challenges.

On the County level, where the staff has also been cut and the hours are short, the libraries have never depended more on volunteers. In fact the County libraries can put a dollar figure to it. The value of volunteering topped the \$1.5 million mark at local libraries, with 2.008 volunteers donating 67,645 hours in 2013. 

A Street Cat Named Bob by James Bowen

A Street Cat Named Bob, the book I chose to review for you, may appear to be no more than, excuse my pun, a piece of "fluff," but Bob... is anything but that.

James Bowen, the author, was freshly off the street, having been living "rough" as they say in London. His is not a glamorous or pretty story: it's the story of a recovering heroin addict and all

the grit that recovery entails. It's about struggle, and it's about the redemptive power of love that exists when a downand-out soul finds friendship in an animal. The animal is Bob, a ginger cat who wanders, injured, into James' life and saves him in a surprising way.



When James begins selling "The Big Issue," a magazine sold by homeless and long-term unemployed people, the story becomes an interesting sociological slice of life. As a former social worker, I found the social dynamics thought-provoking and compelling. Being of nottoo-distant, working-class British ancestry, James' struggle was reminiscent of stories I'd heard when I was growing up, and still

hear from my family in England.

A surprising insight you get from the story is the awesome scope of the internet! You see, James Bowen is not like most authors who write the story of their beloved pet, publish, and then find

fame; James and Bob became famous before James wrote the book! As they continued to sell "The Big Issue" on the street, they were more and more frequently approached by strangers who already knew of them. From Asia, Europe and America, people sought them out after seeing their pictures posted online. Unbeknownst to James, he and Bob had become internet stars, a fact James later confirmed by searching the web at his local library.

A Street Cat Named Bob is a wonderful story that will warm your heart and break it, too. As a side note, if you read the book, do a YouTube search online to see how the world discovered James Bowen and Bob.

I highly recommend this book.
