peace between her eternally warring, long-divorced Catholic mother and Jewish father. She's got enough complications without getting caught in the middle of a stick-up in a gas station minimart and falling in love with a great wall of a man named William Ashe, who willingly steps between the armed robber and her son.

learning that things aren't always what they seem—or what we hope they will be. It's a novel about discovering what we want and ultimately finding what we need.





This year's festival features 24 events over the course of the month including art exhibitions, speakers, workshops, music and theatre. It is the largest and most comprehensive Black history celebration in Georgia.

A few of the new additions to this year's festival include an exhibit by fine art photographer Sheila Pree Bright titled "Invisible Suburbia," the Masters of Soul live at the Roswell Cultural Arts Center, and a special screening of the documentary that was shot during the poetry slam at last year's festival.


They will be joining some of our favorites from the festival including the Unity Concert, which brings together the voices of several of our local church's choirs, as well as the 10th
