

The books have been read, the programs for all ages have concluded, and the final event of the 2012 Roswell Reads lit-




erary season is around the corner.




Smonk, and Hell at the Breech, and a book of stories called Poachers; in addition, he

## Bookstore's 10th Anniversary Celebrated

Almost thirty bookstore volunteers and guests celebrated the 10th anniversary of our bookstore the afternoon of Feb. 19th. There were refreshments, displays of library and bookstore history, and shared stories about the start of

the store and what it has meant to the Friends and to the library.

Helen Tefft, chair of Book Sales and I, as the President of the Friends, met with Lu Conti in the Fall of 200 I to discuss opening a store in a staff office. The

Friends were given the use of half of this room and Helen, our husbands and I went to work. We had a Grand Opening Feb. 1st. Later, Shirley Graham helped get volunteers to keep the store. Her mother made aprons for us and Shirley had luncheons for the volunteers.

Barbara Knapp took over Book Sales a few years later. Janet Laroway took the reins from her and Carol Harrison is now chairman with Mary Mitchell scheduling the volunteers. We have had close to 100 volunteers over the ten years and together we have a good time and contributed a great deal to our library.

The first year of its operation the store made \$1100 and now it brings in over \$40,000 every year. Our contribution enables the library to provide programs and materials for the community that would be too costly otherwise. The Summer Reading Program and Roswell Reads are two examples.

We have since been given the use of the whole staff office, the coat closet in the meeting room, and half the children's department storage room for bookstore use.

We have publicized our organization through the store; we have provided a place for people to bring and buy used books; and we have increased the passion for books and learning in our community through the programs and materi-

als we've bought for the library.


#### A few factoids:
