

The Friends' bookstore closes I/2 hour before the library closes.




Looking to learn a new language? Want to review one you once knew?

devoted and wonderful volunteers. Our next book sale will be August 12-16, 2015.



All the Light We Cannot See

by Anthony Doerr

2015 Pulitzer Prize winner

"A novel to live in, learn from

and feel bereft over when the last page is turned." -- Booklist

This is a story of the Second World War that takes place during the Allied bombing of the walled, seaside city of

Saint-Malo, on the north coast of France, two months after D-Day. We learn the stories of its main characters through multiple, short flashbacks. Keep close track of the chapter headings as you read.

Marie-Laure, a blind French girl, and her father, a locksmith at The Museum of Natural History, flee Paris for Saint-Malo as the Germans approach. They make their way to the home of his Uncle Etienne, a virtual recluse, and his housekeeper. There, Marie-Laure's father once again creates a tiny model of their neighborhood for his daughter, built to scale, so that

she can learn it and have a measure of independence outside their home.

Werner is a German orphan who is destined for a life in the mines. He is trapped, he feels, but gains hope when he reconstructs a radio and begins to hear the voice of a stranger telling stories over the wires. He develops a talent for repairing radios that earns him a place in an elite paramilitary school for Hitler youth.

We know that ultimately these two young people will meet, but how and under what circumstances remains a mystery until late in the book.

This is historical fiction at its best.
